I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.... [So] speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. (Ephesians 4:1-6, 15-16)

In just a few days, on March 5th, we will join together at Emmanuel Lutheran with our siblings in Christ for the Ash Wednesday service, the beginning of the Lenten season. We'll gather again with our longtime friends for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services (separate services this year!) at Zwingli. These services mark important times in our Lenten journey and celebrate significant moments in Jesus' life and in our lives as the body of Christ. As you know, Lent encompasses 40 days in all, beginning Ash Wednesday and running through Holy Saturday. Yes, that's 46 days, but the Sundays are not counted. Sundays are breaks in the season and are days of sabbath rest as well as a time to celebrate the resurrection - "little easters" as some have called Sunday worship.

Lent is a time when we give special attention to our faith and our call to follow Jesus. In light of all that is happening in our communities, country, and world these days, our Lenten journey is especially important as we reflect on and reclaim the values of Jesus whose focus is on healing, unity, hospitality/welcome, service with those in need, humility, speaking the truth in love,

grace, mercy, forgiveness and peace (just a few of the Jesus values I could mention).

So, I invite you this Lenten season to truly reflect on ways you can develop your faith and follow Jesus. Perhaps it may mean shutting off technology and distractions, lighting a candle and sitting in silent prayer for 15 minutes. It may mean dropping one of your activities to serve at a soup kitchen or visit those who are sick. It may mean eating healthier and exercising to care for yourself and thus having more energy for others and for God. Perhaps Sunday mornings can be reserved for worship and praise, a time to gather in the Spirit of Christ with others on our Lenten journey. We can create space to spend time with a special Lenten devotional. We can also work to let go of our fear as we learn to embrace greater trust in God. Or, let go of our impatience, while embracing healthy spiritual, physical and emotional practices that will help us develop patience and perseverance. Life is all about letting go and embracing, and Lent is the perfect time to practice this critical spiritual discipline.

In whatever way we observe Lent, it is a time that directs us toward the very substance and ground of our faith. It is in this time that we draw closer to the One who gives us life and inspires us to the “calling to which we have been called.” May we be attentive to this call and embrace God’s grace as we are equipped for Christ’s ministry in the church and world. May the Spirit enliven and bless you in your journey!

A MESSAGE FROM OUR MISSIONARY, KATE SAURMAN OF SHORES OF GRACE

Hello dear friends and family. I began writing this message in January which was human trafficking awareness month, and have since re-written it many times. So, I must apologize that I missed the window of “trending” time to talk about this issue since Brazil is the largest supplier of sex slaves in Latin America. Many women and children are first put to work as prostitutes within the country before being sent off overseas in international rings. Here as in most countries, trafficking is driven primarily by poverty. Vulnerable, desperate families doing whatever they need to survive. Displacement and homelessness also play a large role in recruitment. We have a large problem in Brazil in that many of the children born here are undocumented, simply because mothers often lack the resources or access to acquire the correct paperwork. And lack of documentation is always a huge issue when it comes to the movement of people. Many are left feeling like their existence is of little worth. I have worked with numerous girls within Brazil who have aged out of the system and still lacked identification at age 18 when they tried to find work. Applying for and receiving these “letters of belonging” is often of little thought for those who have grown up in survival mode and already don’t believe they belong to greater society.

I want to preface this next paragraph by saying my intention is simply to tell a piece of my story here. As a kid, I always said that I prefer to learn through experience than through books; a statement I don’t know if I agree with anymore. These lessons we learn firsthand are often riddled with trauma and for me, my immigration process to Brazil over the past decade has been anything but easy. My case was complicated by corruption and arrests in the visa issuing department, having to relocate to the other side of America to re-apply, law changes that revoked my ability to stay in the country long term and knowing every year that I may be uprooted again. I made the choice to live this way –

and I don't regret it. I am humbled by the way Christ taught me about the challenges so many face on a much more greater level; even allowing me to share in some of His personal experiences as an immigrant. This year I am making some adjustments to my visa status. Process delays brought my case down to the wire. I was on my last day with a valid visa, praying my documentation came back or I technically would have been here illegally, which is not uncommon. Thank you to Jesus and my lawyer it came at the final moments. It has been distressing to me personally during my own process, to receive all the questions and comments coming in from my community on deportations. A city just north of us has been designated as the official landing site for military flights bringing in deportees. This is the most northern airport in Brazil, chosen to minimize the time these individuals are made to stay in handcuffs. Unless you have been in the position of an immigrant – legal or not, it is hard to imagine the fear and instability that accompanies it. Quite honestly, as Christians – this sense of being “homeless on earth”, has been a historical part of our identity – wandering refugees. God told Abraham – “Leave your country, your kindred, and your father's household, and go to the land I will show you”. This verse has brought me much comfort over the years knowing those who do move away from their homes, are following in a rich tradition of our faith – physically embodying the truth that they are not only citizens of this bordered world, but citizens of a kingdom far beyond the borders. This reality is a humble and vulnerable place to dwell. Through the little I have personally tasted of immigration challenges, I am heartbroken over the treatment people are receiving and my prayers are with the many displaced. I would also ask that you would be praying with me over the next month. My new visa application now has 30 days to be either approved or denied. I hope you are all doing well and deeply planted in the love of Christ for yourselves, your families, your communities, your cities, and this beautifully interconnected world. I am thankful for each of you.

Healthy Moments

Reflection: Starlight and Wisdom

*The Lord is my light and my salvation- whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life- of whom shall I be afraid?
Psalm 27: 1*

REFLECTION: STARLIGHT AND WISDOM

We recently celebrated Epiphany, also known as Theophany and Three Kings Day. It happens after the 12 days of Christmas and

celebrates the day the Magi, or the three kings, visited the baby Jesus in Bethlehem. Some believe the ancient Magi were wise astronomers who paid close attention to the stars and planets above, reading their signs. When a bright star appeared in the eastern sky, they followed this divine light to Bethlehem. Donna Schaper has written a small book, *On Tiptoes In Expectation: Prayers for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany*. Her prayers shine light on familiar scripture passages and offer opportunity to experience the presence of God in our everyday lives.

A cold, wintry day can be an invitation to curl up with a hot drink and a good book like hers. Books offer a window to worlds we have not yet visited. Reading has positive mental and physical benefits. The act of reading strengthens the brain, increases the ability to empathize, reduces stress, and builds vocabulary. Literary fiction that explores the inner lives of characters can heighten our ability to understand the feelings and beliefs of others.

A study published in the *Journal of College Teaching and Learning* found that 30 minutes of reading lowered blood pressure, heart rate, and feelings of psychological distress just as effectively as yoga and humor. Reading with children builds their warm and happy associations with books, increasing the likelihood that they will find reading enjoyable in the future. Doctors at the Cleveland Clinic recommend that parents read with their children beginning as early as infancy and continuing through elementary school years.

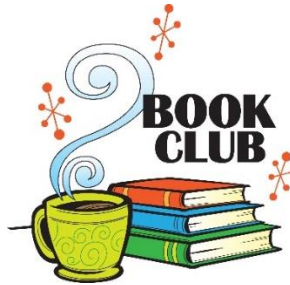
While reading is often solitary, book clubs allow individuals to share their perspectives, engage in meaningful discussions, and learn from others. One of the most significant benefits of a book club is that it encourages reading. Book clubs – in-person or by internet platform sessions - can foster a sense of community and belonging by bringing people together over a shared love of reading and can help individuals develop social skills, such as

active listening and effective communication. What books are on your to-be-read (and re-read) list?

Under the Banner of Heaven: A Story of Violent Faith
by Jon Krakauer

Defying both civil authorities and the Mormon establishment in Salt Lake City, the renegade leaders of these Taliban-like theocracies are zealots who answer only to God; some 40,000 people still practice polygamy in these communities. At the core of Krakauer’s book are brothers Ron and Dan Lafferty, who insist they received a commandment from God to kill a blameless woman and her baby girl. Beginning with a meticulously researched account of this appalling double murder, Krakauer constructs a multi-layered, bone-chilling narrative of messianic delusion, polygamy, savage violence, and unyielding faith. Along the way he uncovers a shadowy offshoot of America’s fastest growing religion and raises provocative questions about the nature of religious belief.

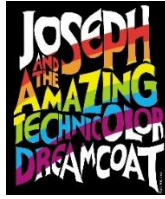
