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A Letter From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Church Family,

The lights have been put away.

The tree has come down.

The decorations and the rush of the holiday season are now behind us.

And yet—quietly, almost imperceptibly—the days are beginning to grow longer. Light is slowly overtaking the darkness, a little more each day.

The earth itself is in transition.

And so are we.

In these coming weeks, we prepare to celebrate the retirement of—and to grieve the leaving of—our beloved Senior Pastor, the Rev. Butch Kuykendall. At the end of January, we will gather for a dinner to celebrate Butch's ministry among us. Then, on Sunday, February 1, we will worship together one final time and offer our goodbyes.

I hope you will be present for the journey ahead; present as we give thanks for Pastor Butch and all he has meant to this community, and present as we prepare to welcome an interim pastor in the season to come. I ask for your prayers as I help lead us through this time of transition, and for your continued

presence in worship and in the life and ministry of the church in the months and years ahead.

Most of all, let us be present for one another.

Our baptism reminds us that faith is never just an individual act. Baptism calls us into solidarity with our siblings in Christ. It binds us together in love, commits us to the ways of God, and invites us to walk the path of Jesus—especially when the road ahead is not yet clear.

Even now, light is growing.

Even now, God is at work.

And even in this season of transition, we move forward together.

ABOUT FASTNACHT (from Wikipedia)

Fastnacht (also spelled [Fasnacht](#), or in [Pennsylvania German](#): Faasenacht) is an annual [Pennsylvania Dutch](#) celebration that falls on [Shrove Tuesday](#), the day before [Ash Wednesday](#). The word translates to "Fasting Night" or "Almost Night" in English. The tradition is to eat the very best foods, which are part of the German tradition, and much of them, before the [Lenten](#) fast. Fastnachts (pronounced [/fastnaxt/](#) in German) are [doughnuts](#). There are three types of [Fasnacht](#), one made with yeast, one made with baking powder, and one made with potatoes and yeast. All are slightly crispy on the outside and not as sweet as standard doughnuts.



Healthy Moment

Age Related Macular Degeneration

“But if your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light; but if they are unhealthy, your body will be full of darkness.” – Matthew 6:22-23

The retina is a thin layer of light-sensitive nerve tissue that lines the back of the eye (or vitreous) cavity. When light enters the eye, it passes through the iris to the retina where images are focused and converted to electrical impulses that are carried by the optic nerve to the brain resulting in sight. According to the American Society of Retina Specialists, Age- Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) is a deterioration of the retina and choroid that leads to a substantial loss in visual acuity (sharpness of vision). AMD is the leading cause of significant visual acuity loss in people over age 50.

The exact cause of AMD is unknown, but the condition develops as the eye ages. There are two types of AMD: dry AMD and wet AMD. In early stages of dry AMD, the key indicator is drusen (pale yellow lesions) formed beneath the retina. Drusen are usually harmless, but as they accumulate, dry AMD can progress. Areas of atrophy or wasting in the retina may develop. If the area is significant and with sharp borders, it is termed geographic atrophy(GA). GA is the advanced form of dry AMD, which may be associated with loss of central vision.

In wet AMD, there is a sudden or gradual decrease in visual acuity causing blind spots in the center of the vision, and distortion of straight lines. The indicator of wet AMD is when abnormal blood

vessels grow beneath the retina. These can bleed or leak, causing a distortion of the retina's structure. This can turn into a scar that replaces the normal structure of the outer retina and leads to permanent loss of central vision.

Risk factors for AMD include age, Caucasian race, family history of AMD, and cigarette smoking. Other possible risk factors include female gender, light iris color, far-sightedness, cardiovascular heart disease, and high blood pressure. In addition, high cholesterol, sunlight exposure, low dietary fish intake, elevated body mass index (BMI) can also contribute to the risk of developing AMD.

In the early stages, AMD may have no symptoms at all. As the disease progresses, the symptoms noted will be distortion of straight lines (look warped). There may also be a decrease in the intensity or brightness of colors. As the macular degeneration progresses, AMD symptoms include a gradual or sudden loss of central vision or dark, blurry areas in the center of vision.

Diagnostic testing can be done in the office of ophthalmologists. Treatment for AMD has been significantly perfected in recent years. Drugs have been developed to help stop the progression and help preserve the vision of patients with wet AMD. Wet AMD cannot be cured but its progression may be blocked with the use of eye injections.

The Age Related Eye Disease Studies conducted by the National Eye Institute have found that a nutritional supplement formula may delay and prevent intermediate dry AMD from moving to the advanced form. The AREDS-2 is available over the counter and contains specific doses of vitamins and minerals that include Vitamin C, Vitamin E, Zinc, Lutein, and Zeaxanthin. Also, following a diet that includes fish (especially salmon) and eating leafy green vegetables will also help to deter progression of the eye disease. All adults who have reached the age of 50 or above should seriously consider incorporating eye exams as part of their regular routine to promote good eye health.

They **provide ongoing assistance, referrals, coaching, and support** by individually assessing and building personal relationships. This is accomplished by removing barriers, eliminating bureaucracy, and inviting people in crises by contacting them directly. In 2024, **they served more than 500,000** people with the help of **3,620 volunteers, 13 full-time staff, and 345 community partners**.

After learning what people need to move forward, Mitzvah Circle chooses from over 100 different items to prepare care packages containing clothing, shoes, diapers, period supplies, books, household goods, toiletries, and more. Every package is hand-picked by volunteers to match the family's specific needs.

What is One Great Hour of Sharing®?

One Great Hour of Sharing, part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. One Great Hour of Sharing also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

Over fifty-five percent (55%) of the UCC's offering supports international development initiatives. The offering also funds refugee resettlement, disaster preparedness and response, and disaster-related volunteer initiatives in the U.S. and internationally.

The United Church of Christ responds to humanitarian and development needs in the world. Specifically, the UCC supports sustainable development and refugee needs internationally and provides disaster relief and immigration assistance in the United States. The United Church of Christ responds as a member of organizations such as Church World Service and the ACT Alliance. We also support the direct mission efforts of churches and church-based organizations that the United Church of Christ and

the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) have direct partnerships with through Global Ministries. Nearly one-fifth of the UCC's OGHS offering is shared through Church World Service to support refugee, and disaster programs worldwide.

On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 95 cents is used directly for mission programming; and 5 cents for interpretation materials. The associated administrative costs are paid by gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic Support.

FEBRUARY IS AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Why We Celebrate

Correcting the Historical Record: Historically, Black narratives were often systematically excluded from mainstream history books. This month ensures these contributions are recognized as central to the American story rather than a mere footnote.

Honoring Neglected Achievements: As President Gerald Ford noted when officially recognizing the month in 1976, it is an opportunity to honor "too-often neglected accomplishments" in every field, from science and arts to politics and religion.

Fostering Unity and Identity: The celebration helps affirm Black identity and resilience while fostering a deeper public understanding of how past injustices shape the present.

Inspiring Future Generations: By highlighting extraordinary stories beyond typical textbooks, the month serves as a catalyst for ongoing work toward equality and social justice.

Origins and Timing

The celebration began as "Negro History Week" in 1926, founded by historian Carter G. Woodson. February was chosen because it encompasses the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, two figures who were traditionally honored by the Black community for their roles in emancipation and abolition.

By the late 1960s, the Civil Rights Movement propelled the expansion of the week into a month-long observance on college campuses, leading to its official national recognition during the 1976 U.S. Bicentennial.

5. Hang it somewhere visible as a reminder to put love into action every day!


