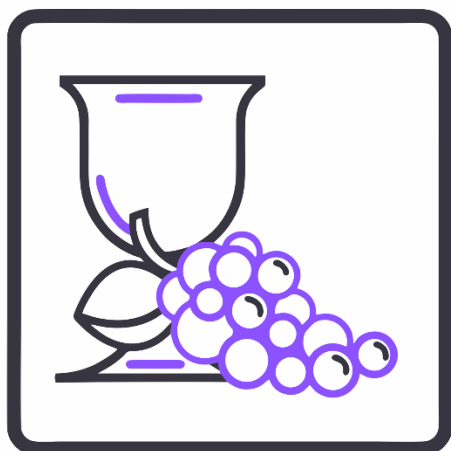

To have easy classroom space with access to a beautiful kitchen as well as growing space, made delivering the class almost effortless as well as contributing greatly to the engagement of the enrollees.

Each week, the instructors were treated to stories on personal seed starting and discovering new possibilities from excited new gardeners. And lots of questions, so many questions.... ;)

Access to the kitchen for our last class allowed the instructor (retired from a career in food prep) to craft delicious roasted veggie tacos- highlighting using garden produce in a novel way.

The post course evaluations mentioned trying new veggies to grow and eat, and a newfound appreciation for the wide variety of “eating” plants that can be grown in our little corner of Montgomery County. Those of you who were in attendance to the presentation back in March may remember the last slide had a photo of some really interesting eggplants. S2S is all about access.

But really, I am writing to thank you for so much more. In my time as a resident of Souderton, Zwingli has always been a fantastic community partner. KEYSTONE CONFERENCE FIRST ANNUAL MEETING

It was a delight to be part of the first annual meeting of the newly formed Keystone Conference of the United Christ of Christ.

This Conference now encompasses the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as well as small parts of Maryland and New Jersey. It is a beautiful thing to behold!

It was the most meaningful and inspiring Conference meeting in my 50 years of ordained ministry. This was due to a number of things culminating in a wonderful spiritual experience. First, we heeded St. Paul's instructions, "that all of you agree and that there be no dissensions among you...." (I Corinthians 1: 10)

Many commented on how we all wanted to get along and not be pointing fingers at others to prove how wrong they are. Some said it was the first Church Conference meeting they attended where everyone actually expressed love for one another.

This expression came to a head with the presentation of support and love for Trinity UCC (Dorseyville) near Pittsburgh. The church sanctuary had recently been destroyed in a devastating fire. Their pastor, Dave Mears, received overwhelming support and love from the Conference which brought tears to many. In addition to spiritual support, prayers and practical gifts of needed

supplies; financial offerings in excess of \$60,000 was given. Pastor Mears could barely speak.

[I am honored that Rev. Dave Mears was in my first confirmation class when I was fresh out of Seminary in 1976. God often has a way of bringing things full circle.]

Marcia McFee led our high-energy, participatory worship experiences with skill and meaning that drew everyone into a communal body. This was accomplished through her innovative worship techniques and the powerful use of music. Kudos to our Conference led musicians who are highly gifted spiritually.

A special highlight and gift from God was the address given by PA Secretary of Agriculture, Russell Redding. He is a UCC member of Trinity UCC in Gettysburg. Secretary Redding was confirmed twice unanimously by the Pennsylvania Senate—something almost unheard of today! He is active in the food pantry ministry of his local congregation. And he gave a remarkable address highlighting our Conference theme “Joy at the Table.” Secretary Redding presented the scripture with the authority of a theologian and the delivery of a pastor. He addressed the issue with the knowledge of an Agricultural Degree and the practical experience of a farmer. Redding shared that he and his wife harvest together and either can stack the hay bales or drive the tractor! (That really endeared him to the congregation.)

One of his quotes that I wrote down is, “When you have more than you need, expand the table—don’t build higher fences.” What a great interpretation and expansion of several biblical parables!

We are more than blessed to have Secretary Russell Redding as part of our new Keystone Conference.

I was thrilled to meet Mary Luti. She is one of my favorite Stillspeaking Writers who contributes regularly to the UCC Daily Devotions (which you can receive daily by email). Mary knew who

I was because I comment and compliment her periodically on her devotional writings. So we were online “friends” but it was so good to greet her in the flesh!

And her energy overwhelmed me! Mary is such a powerful teacher that I found myself hanging on her every word. Needless to say, I was pleased to learn of her interpretation of Holy Communion as a radical witness for justice, the breaking down of barriers and inviting everyone, everyone, to the table. It is not our table, it is God’s.

Mary is a gift to the whole church as she continues to be a Seminary professor.

What surprised me most was when our small table shared our evaluations, highlights and what we will take back to our congregations. Every person at our table highlighted Mary Luti as one of the most moving things with her interpretation of communion and justice. They said, “I never thought of that before, it was always just personal and my salvation,...now it is communal and inclusive of others.”

In addition to all of these gifts and graces the Keystone Conference was fortunate to be favored by the presence of our denominational leader, General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ, The Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson. Dr. Thompson not only shared inspiring remarks about our denomination and Conference; but she opened her heart and soul about her own faith journey, her family and how sacred is our call from God to the United Church of Christ in our world today. I feel like Dr. Thompson’s strongest asset is her ability to make a personal connection with everyone in a room of 600 people.

All of this movement of the meeting was presided over masterfully by our Transitional Executive Conference Minister, The Rev. Dr. Carrie Call.

She conducted each session with dignity, grace and humor which set the perfect tone for the first annual meeting of our newly formed Keystone Conference. We are blessed by her leadership.

MISSION PROJECT - SUPPORT TRINITY UCC DORSEYVILLE, PA



On May 6, 2026, a fire erupted at Trinity United Church of Christ in Dorseyville, Pennsylvania. Rev. Healthy Moment
How Clean Is Your Water Bottle??

¹⁰ From the same mouth comes a blessing and a curse. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. ¹¹ Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water?" James 3:10-11

It has become common practice to see people walking around with reusable water bottles/cups. There are many brand names, but common ones you may see are the Yeti, Stanley Cup, and Hydro Flask. These reusable water bottles/cups are seen at schools, sports events, gyms, church, being carried around while shopping. They are seen everywhere and in many different colors. Typically, people are filling the bottles several times per day. The question to be considered is how often are people cleaning their water containers/cups and is it enough?

You may be thinking, “So what is the big deal if it is only water that you are putting in the bottle?” The water that you are using to fill the containers is most likely clean and safe to drink. The problem occurs when you keep putting your mouth on the straw or mouth piece. There is bacteria in your mouth and that will be transferred to the water bottle with constant use. Germs are everywhere and can be found in the air, on your hands and on surfaces. By constantly touching the water bottle, those germs are passed onto the surface of the bottle and eventually to the mouthpiece. Backwash can also occur, adding germs to the inside of the water bottle. Saliva contains nutrients that can help the germs in your bottle to thrive. That added to a dark warm place to hide, creates an excellent environment for the buildup of germs and bacteria. Your ability to fight off infection is dependent on your immune system and its resistance to disease.

Other habits that may increase the contamination risks for your water bottle is if you add juice to the bottle or coffee/tea with milk or sugar. Sugar contributes to the development of bacteria and allows it to thrive. Sharing your water bottle with others can add to the contamination risks. Using the bathroom and not thoroughly washing hands will transfer germs to the surface of the water bottle, and then to the mouthpiece of the bottle.

Reusable water bottles/cups require a daily cleaning. You should have a bottle brush and a small brush to clean inside the mouthpiece and/or reusable straw. Some tips to consider for cleaning the reusable bottles include:

1. *Pick a bottle that is easy to clean.* A bottle with hard-to-reach crevices is not the best choice. Narrow opening, intricate lid designs or straws makes it difficult to clean. Use a long bottle brush and soap to get to the bottom of the bottle and give it a good scrub. Likewise clean the mouthpiece with a smaller brush. Scrub the outside of the bottle. Allow to air dry on a rack before using again.
2. *Be sure to clean all the pieces.* No matter what type of water bottle you have, be sure to take it apart and clean all the parts with hot soapy water.
3. *Get a second bottle.* The bottles should be washed and allowed to air dry before using them again. Having a second bottle will help to assure the bottle is cleaned and dried properly before needing to use it.
4. Avoid putting anything other than water in your bottle.
5. On a monthly basis, consider a *deep cleaning of the water bottle* by using vinegar. Make a diluted vinegar solution by mixing 1 part distilled white vinegar with 4 parts water. Fill the bottle with the vinegar solution. Shake vigorously and let soak overnight. Soak other parts of the bottle in a vinegar solution. Pour off the vinegar solution and rinse the bottle and other pieces. Let the bottle and pieces air dry on a clean dry rack.

Using some TLC and good hygiene habits with your water bottle, will help to assure that the water you are drinking is not overflowing with harmful critters taking up residence in your water bottle.

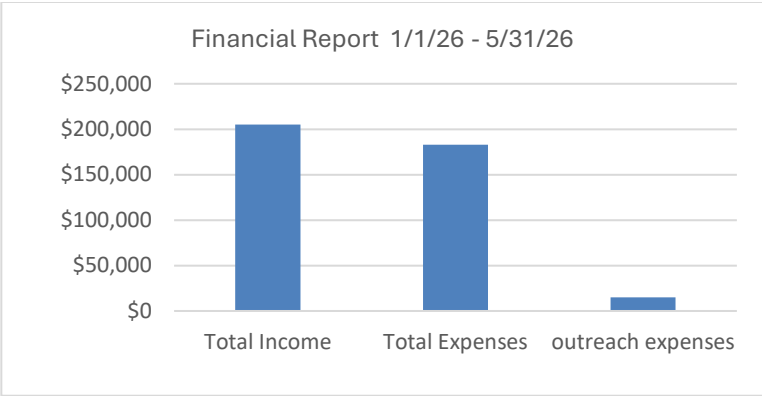

MINISTRY OF STEWARDS FINANCIAL UPDATE FOR
1/1/26 – 5/31/26

Financial update for time frame 1/1/26 – 5/31/26. The positive giving from the last five months has continued through the end of May. We were blessed with generous gifts from so many which has allowed us to have total income of \$205,285 as compared to expenses of \$183,116. Our donations to UCC outreach and other outreach organizations were \$15,128 for this period of time.

Looking ahead, we are now officially in the summer months and vacation season has begun. Our consistent giving will be more important than ever. **Have you ever considered electronic giving for your weekly offering?** This method of giving helps the church tremendously, especially when members are away as their offering will still be here. Electronic giving also helps the church to know a portion of our income that is available for any given month.
